



# PRESCHOOL CLASSROOM HEALTH ALERT NOTICE



Dear Parent/Guardian:

We would like to inform you that there has been a child in your child's classroom that has a confirmed case of the illness checked below. Your child may or may not have been exposed to this illness. This note is just a "head's up" for you to be aware of the symptoms of the illness and watch your child for any of these signs/symptoms. Please consult with your physician if your child becomes ill. 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\_\_\_\_\_ CHICKEN POX: Onset of symptoms is 2-3 weeks after exposure. Symptoms may include: fever, irritable, blister-like skin rash. If your child is diagnosed as having Chicken Pox, your child is contagious until all lesions are dry and scabbed over. Your child will need to remain at home until all scabs are dry/scabbed over and he/she is feeling better.

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\_\_\_\_\_ **MEASLES (RUBEOLA):** Onset of symptoms is 1-2 weeks after exposure. Symptoms may include: fever, cough, runny nose, watery eyes, bright red and raised rash-usually in patches. If diagnosed with Measles, do not send your child to school until 5 days after the appearance of the rash and the child is feeling better.

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HEAD LICE: For 2 weeks after your child has been potentially exposed to lice, check your child's hair and scalp for lice and/or nits (tiny, pearly white, egg shaped that stick to the hair). The best place to check is at the neckline and around the ears. Other symptoms include scratching head and complaints of an "itchy head". If you find that your child has Head Lice, contact your child's teacher or advocate to report this. You can contact your Health Department, Pharmacist, or Physician for appropriate treatment.

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\_\_\_\_\_ **PINK-EYE (CONJUNCTIVITIS):** Onset of symptoms is typically 24-72 hours after exposure. Symptoms may include: irritated, reddened and watery eyes, swollen eyelids, and yellowish discharge making eyes sticky or hard to open, especially in the morning. If you see these or any other abnormal symptoms, contact your physician. If your child has been diagnosed with Pink-eye, do not send your child back to school until physician advises or at least 24 hours after beginning treatment.

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\_\_\_\_\_ **RINGWORM:** Onset varies upon contact with source. Symptoms may include: rounded, reddish area with scaly or blistered bordered and is often itchy. If you notice these symptoms, contact your physician. Cover the sore areas with clothing or a dry bandage. If your child is diagnosed with Ringworm, do not send him/her to school until 24 hours after treatment has begun. Keep areas covered.

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STREP THROAT or SCARLET FEVER: Both of these conditions are caused by the same bacteria. Onset of symptoms is usually 2-5 days after exposure. Symptoms may include: sore throat, fever and occasionally a rash. Please consult with your physician if your child has these symptoms.

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\_\_\_\_\_ PINWORMS: Symptoms may include: Itching of the anal area-especially at night-time. This is the most common symptom. Also lack of sleep and loss of appetite may occur. If you see these symptoms, consult with your physician as well as observe other family members for symptoms.

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\_\_\_\_\_ **SCABIES:** Onset of symptoms is 2-6 weeks after exposure. Symptoms may include: red, itchy rash that appears in wavy lines on hands, wrists, elbows, armpits, stomach, back or buttocks. If you see symptoms, check all family members for symptoms. If you see symptoms, please contact your physician. If your child is diagnosed with scabies, do not send your child to school until the first treatment is completed.

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\_\_\_\_\_ **IMPETIGO:** Onset of symptoms varies. Symptoms may include: Blister-like pus-filled bumps that progress to yellowish crusted irregular shaped sores. Itching is common and these areas are usually found on exposed areas of the skin, typically the face. If you see symptoms, please contact your physician. If your child is diagnosed with impetigo, do not send your child to school until 24 hours after the first treatment is started and the sores are healing.

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
